arXiv Submission Policy

Having a paper on arXiv arXiv.org, TechRxiv.org, or any not-for-profit preprint server approved by the IEEE Publication Services and Products Board (PSPB) does not prohibit authors from submitting a paper to QCE26. arXiv papers are not peer-reviewed and not considered formal publications. Hence, arXiv papers do not count as prior work. Authors are not expected to compare their submission to an arXiv version of the paper, provided the paper has not appeared in a journal or workshop/conference proceedings.

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The use of AI-generated content in an article (including but not limited to text, figures, images, and code) shall be disclosed in the acknowledgments section of any article submitted to an IEEE publication. The Generative AI system used shall be identified, and specific sections of the article that use AI-generated content shall be identified and accompanied by a brief explanation regarding the level at which the Generative AI system was used to generate the content. Using Generative AI systems for editing and grammar enhancement is standard practice today and, as such, is generally outside the intent of the above policy. In this case, disclosure is not required.

Author Guidance on Text Produced by Generative AI Tools

The QCE26 conference allows tools, such as OpenAI ChatGPT, Microsoft Copilot, Google Gemini, Perplexity, Grammarly, and other AI assistants to help improve the paper submission text. We recommend reviewing your submission for language issues using these AI services. Of course, using such Generative AI services is not required. As required by IEEE, the use of any AI-generated text shall be disclosed in the acknowledgments section. The sections of the paper that use AI-generated text shall have a citation to the Generative AI system used to generate the text.
